The Bessemer City Council met in regular session on Monday, June 13th, 2016 at 7:00 PM in the Council Chamber of City Hall.

Members Present

Call to Order, Prayer, Pledge of Allegiance

Mayor Smith called the meeting to order. First Baptist Church Reverend Tom Ravan led in prayer. Mayor Smith followed by leading in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Approval of the May Agenda

Special Presentations

Section 13. There is hereby levied a tax rate of forty-five (\$.45) per one hundred dollars (\$100) valuation of property taxes as of January 1, 2015 for the purpose of raising the revenue listed 'Ad Valorem Taxes' in the General Fund. This rate is on a total valuation of property for the purposes of \$313,442,907 and an estimated rate of collection of 97%. The estimated rate of collection is the fiscal 2015-2016 collection rate of 97%. The motor vehicle tag fee per G.S. 20.97 is set at \$10 per vehicle.

Section 14. A fee of \$10.50 per month per roll-out cart (residential, commercial or industrial) the City when the City provides garbage/trash collection service shall be charged and collected as an addition to the utility bill for the purpose of Landfill and Disposal fees.

Section 15. A fee of \$3.50 per month per roll-out cart within the City when the Cityprovides Collection service shall be charged and collected as an addition to the utility bill for the purpose Disposal fees.

Section 16. A fee of \$10.00 per month per residential/apartment unit within the City shall be as an additional fee for bulk item, brush, and debris pickup if a solid waste and/or recycling fee is not charged.

Section 20. All other fees for service, surcharges, etc. previously established by Council shall same unless adjusted at some future date. All billing not paid on the due date is subject to a 10% late penalty.

Section 21. The Budget Officer is hereby authorized to transfer appropriations within a fund as herein as

a. He may transfer amounts between object of expenditure within a department as Ordinance without limitations.

b. He may transfer amounts up to \$7,500 between departments as defined by Ordinance same fund with report on such transfers at the next regular Council meeting.

Section 22. Copies of the Budget Ordinance shall be furnished to all Department Heads for the disbursements of funds. A copy shall always be available for public inspection in the Clerk's office.

<u>Capital Project Ordinance: Sewer System Improvement Project</u>: The City Manager, James Inman went into detail about what the project entailed. By motion of Alfred Carpenter and unanimous vote the ordinance was approved.

Interlocal Agreement: Natural Gas: This is an agreement for emergency assistance between the City and other public gas systems. The City Manager, James Inman went into detail about what the project entailed. By motion of Dan Boling and unanimous vote the agreement was approved.

UDO Text Change Public Hearing

By motion of Dan Boling and unanimous vote, the public hearing opened at 7:20PM. Mayor Smith asked if there was anyone to speak in favor of the text change. City Planner, Jeffrey Kirchner, explained to Mayor Smith and Council the requested change.

By motion of Joe Will the text change was approved. By motion of Kay McCathen and unanimous vote a motion to close the public hearing was made at 7:29PM.

<u>**City Manager's Report-</u>** Mr. James Inman, City Manager, invited everyone to the Bessemer City Community Center dedication on Saturday, June 25th. City Manager also welcomed City Council to attend Chief Ellis' mother's service. Discussion was had about other updates.</u>

<u>Council General Discussion</u>: Mayor Smith invited everyone to attend the Purple Heart presentation on Wednesday at 11:00 AM. The organization was started to assist with local improvements to infrastructure.
